Enrolments for 2018 First Semester at Egmont Village School

Enrolment at the school is governed by an enrolment scheme, details of which are available from th school office. Applications for out of zone places are now being invited for students wishing to enr between 30th January and 6th July 2018

The Board has determined that up to 5 places for out of zone new entrant students are likely to be available in the 1st semester. The exact number of places will depend on the number of application ceived from students within the school's home zone.

For students seeking enrolment for this enrolment period, the deadline for receipt of applications for out of zone places is 15th September 2017. Application for enrolment should be made on the appropriate form which is available from the school office.

If the number of out of zone applicants exceeds the number of places available, students will be selected by ballot which will be held on 20th September. Parents will be informed of the ballot with three school days of the ballot being held.
