

Purangi Kiwi

Purangi Kiwi is fast developing as a premiere nature space. Our national icon is flourishing with the help of this fantastic group right here in Purangi Ingwood/Taranaki. The project at Purangi now covers 13,000 hectares and is home to 3500 to 4000 Western Brown Kiwi with over 880 breeding pairs. The ongoing predator control allows the population to continue to increase. This is a success story turning a declining population into one which is growing and is now a national stronghold for the future of the kiwi. Purangi Kiwi are unashamedly parochial and feel a sense of ownership and responsibility for their kiwi.

Purangi Kiwi Leaping Ahead

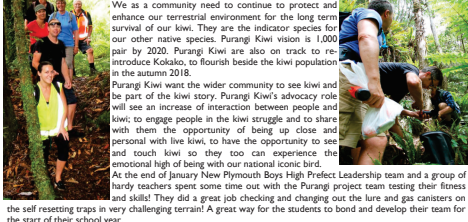
We as a community need to continue to protect and enhance our terrestrial environment for the long term survival of our kiwi. They are the indicator species for our other native species. Purangi Kiwi vision is 1,000 pair by 2020. Purangi Kiwi are also on track to re-introduce Kokako, to flourish beside the kiwi population in the autumn 2018.

Purangi Kiwi want the wider community to see kiwi and be part of the kiwi story. Purangi Kiwi's advocacy role will see an increase of interaction between people and kiwi, to engage people in the struggle and to share with them the opportunity of being up close and personal with live kiwi, to have the opportunity to see and touch kiwi so they too can experience the emotional high of being with our national iconic bird.

At the end of January New Plymouth Kiwis High Precept Leadership team and a group of hardy teachers spent some time out with the Purangi project team testing their fitness and skills! They did a great job checking and changing out the lure and gas canisters on the self resetting traps in very challenging terrain! A great way for the students to bond and develop their team for the start of their school year.

The Annual Purangi Kiwi project guided walk fundraiser was held in January. A hardy bunch of attendees and volunteers all set off en masse with Karen Schumacher following behind in the little farm truck picking up the stragglers or those just wishing to hitch a ride to the top of the hill. (The kids were quick to jump on board!)

Bob Schumacher gave an informative talk about the project and using his telemetry set (it tracks for transmitting kiwi), he 'beeped' for kiwi presence. All were delighted to learn that our kiwi 'Baccy' was within 15 metres from the group! An obvious highlight of the day.

Gardening With Sue From Hammer (Sue Marsh)

The vegetable garden is growing so well this summer, with the crops enjoying the warmer weather, and now we have had some more rain, plants will be going wild, so will the weeds! We are now looking to start those plants off for our winter garden, like cabbage, broccoli, and cauliflower as some of the space becomes available, but we do always have to contend with the 'white butterfly', devouring our new plants. So what are they? There are many types of caterpillars which are usually the larval (caterpillar of a grub) stage of moths such as cabbage moth (Pieris rapae), Cabbage white butterfly (Pieris rapae). Cabbage white butterfly is white with distinct black spots on the wings and is around 40mm across. The cabbage moth is greyish and small and is around 10mm across. The moths and butterflies lay their eggs on the underside of leaves. The larvae of caterpillars hatch from the eggs and then feed on the leaves or fruit, so it's the caterpillar of the cabbage white butterfly or cabbage moth which does the damage. The blue-green smooth textured caterpillar is that of the cabbage white butterfly, while the caterpillar which is green-brown is that of the cabbage moth. They both start eating the outer leaves before moving to the inner heart of the cabbage. It is a good idea to try and either pick off the caterpillars or spray them when they are still on the outside of the leaf, before they tunnel into the heart. Plants favoured by cabbage moth and cabbage white butterfly include cabbage, broccoli, Brussel sprouts, Chinese cabbage, celery, brocceroi, rocket and watercress. So build a shelter, over your plants if you can, I have had some

Yesterday, we went on one of our rare trips to the cinema. We went to see the newly released film 'Breathless'. It is the story of Robin Cavendish and his wife Diana. They got married and went to Kenya where he worked. It was there that he contracted polio at the age of 28. He was playing an energetic game of tennis and shortly afterwards collapsed and was rushed to hospital and put on a ventilator. Robin was paralysed from the neck down and there was no chance of recovery. He was not expected to live for very long and seemed to be destined to spend what time he had left in hospital. Diana had other thoughts. She arranged for Robin to be airlifted from Kenya back to England where he was hospitalised. Diana went out and bought a house with the intention of getting Robin to lead a more normal existence. With the help of a very inventive friend a chair was made up, complete with a ventilator on board. Against his doctor's orders and protestations he was moved to their home. Robin, with the help of Diana and their son Jonathan, went on to be an advocate for people with disabilities. He tested the prototypes of many versions of the mobility chair and toured the world encouraging doctors to think differently about disabled people. He died at the age of 46. We can all learn from his life story as it shows what positive thinking can achieve. The film was more poignant for us as we knew Diana's brothers, but sadly we were unaware of Robin and Diana.

No Rooks Wanted In Taranaki

the public to report potential sightings of a large black glossy bird called a rook. It is slightly larger than a magpie, with a harsh call.

The public should contact Taranaki Regional Council - 0800 736 222 - about any potential sightings, noting the number of birds, location and behaviour. Are they flying and in what direction, are they feeding or roosting? Rooks are a pest animal, which in high numbers are capable of wiping out crops and horticulture, and have been sighted in New Plymouth.

The Council wants to eradicate them before they become established in the region. Rooks have so far been prevented from establishing in Taranaki and sightings are extremely rare. However, rooks have been a problem in the east of the North Island, from Wellington to the Hawkes Bay. Slightly larger than a magpie, the birds are capable of wiping out crops in a few days, as flocks target them as an alternative food source to insects. Rooks may target young crops, especially cereals and new grass, eating grubs, seed or seedlings. Ripening walnuts are also a favourite.

They can also impact the native bird population as they harass native birds and restrict their range. Rooks like nesting in the tops of tall pines and eucalyptus trees, but have been known to nest in other types of trees. Twigs, leaves, and pine needles are used to build their nests, which are usually lined with wool and grass. Rooks often nest within metres of each other, in groups called rookeries. They can have up to six eggs. Rooks are the only pest animal where total eradication is sought in Taranaki.
