It all came down to a top of the table clash at the end of a challenging and exciting season for the AFC Inglewood Taranaki Division Three Team. A win or draw for Inglewood would see them crowned champions of the Division Three, the best opportunity for the senior teams to win silverware in over 20 years.



The eagerly anticipated game of the division's top two goal scoring teams did not disappoint. Although it was not the anticipated flurry of goals, the game was end to end, played with plenty of passion and commitment, but all within the realms of sportsmanship and fair play. Inglewood took the lead mid-way through the first half, but this was nullified by an immediate Rangers equaliser. The game ended 1-1 at the end of the first half. Inglewood had more in terms of chances in the first half, but the score was probably a fair reflection of both teams' efforts.

Inglewood came flying out of the blocks at the start of the second half and it was this pressure that paid dividends, with a second goal being scored approximately 15 minutes after the break. The 2024 season was meant to be a season of transition for the Division Three team, with a new coach and several senior players bidding farewell to their senior careers. The squad ending up comprising of a mix of youth and experience at the start of the season, of senior members experiencing their first season of senior football. However, it turned out that this blend was a catalyst for success, with the team winning seven out of the first eight games, and amassing 30 points in a 15-game season with one match to spare. Gardening Clues with Sue (Sue Marley)
Here we are in the final month of winter, and as we go into our week, we are forecast to get some lovely sunny days, but beware those early morning frosts. We look forward with anticipation of the next growing season, remember to get all those winter maintenance jobs done, while the weather is good for gardening. By now, all roses should have been pruned, as well as hydrangeas, plus tree trees, but if you haven't had time, don't delay in finishing these jobs. Finish off with a clean up spray, removing all dead and diseased branches from trees, and why not mulch now. Feed pansies, polyanthus and violas with a balanced fertilizer once a month to promote healthy growth and blooming. Deadheading is also important for these plants to encourage continuous blooming. As the flowers fade, simply pinch or snip them off to promote new blooms. It's also a good idea to remove any yellowing or damaged leaves to keep the plants looking their best. Pansies, polyanthus and violas are relatively pest and disease resistant, but keep an eye out for common garden pests such as aphids, snails and slugs. If pests become a problem, treat the plants with an appropriate insecticide or pesticide to protect them. With proper care and attention, these flowers will reward you with their beautiful blooms throughout the growing season. Keep successive plantings of your favourite vegetables, readily available in punnets. Give your tunnelhouse a good clean out, washing all surfaces down with detergent, and even some bleach. It will increase the light by removing all the build-up of dirt, and haziness from your glass, and plastic surfaces. Your plants will love every bit of extra sunshine they get! Well, plenty to do this week, so happy gardening.

Enrolment at Inglewood School is governed by an enrolment scheme, details of which are available on the school website or from the school office. The board is now inviting applications from parents who wish to enrol their children at Inglewood Primary School starting within Term 4 2024.

All applications must be received by 3.00pm Monday 9 September for Term 3 2024. If a ballot for out of zone places is required, it will be held on Wednesday 11 September 2024.

Parents will be informed of the outcome of the ballot within three school days of the ballot being held. The exact number of places will depend on the number of applications received from students who live within the school's home zone. Parents of students who live within the home zone and intend enrolling their child at any time during the year should notify the school to assist the school to plan appropriately.

The application form for enrolment is available from the school website, or from the school office. Please note, that if the number of out-of-zone applications exceeds the number of places available, students will be selected by ballot. Parents will be informed of the outcome of the ballot within three school days of the ballot being held.
