

Te noninga o Hākūrturi - Taranaki's New Environment Centre

EAST TARANAKI PĀHĀNOKI **TE Kaitiaki Take Kōwhiri** **THE Taranaki District Council**
Inglewood is set to become the epicentre of a Taranaki Environment Centre. The \$4 million centre adjoins the Joe Gibbs Reserve and Kurapepe Stream and is a partnership between East Taranaki Environment Collective, Pukerangahua Iahā and New Plymouth District Council. It will be a shared space for organisations working in the conservation and pest management sectors, and as a place of learning.

In conjunction with the building project, the NPDC will restore part of the property into wetland and native bush areas featuring a wide range of native plant species. Inglewood's walkway network will be expanded so it leads walkers through it and the centre will be positioned on a rise overlooking all of it. Inglewood is midway between Te Papakōwhiri o Taranaki/Ōrangi National Park and thousands of hectares of forest in rugged country to the east and easily accessible from all main centres. The centre will comprise a simple but robust series of pole shed type structures linked with covered walkways. This will allow staged development if necessary, as costs and funding permit.

"We are really proud to be regenerating this reserve into a habitat for native birds and insects, at the same time as ETEC and Pukerangahua are developing the centre to enhance biodiversity," says NPDC's Renee Davies and ETEC chair Rob Mestey. "Te noninga o Hākūrturi will be a place where the conservation community can come together to share, co-ordinate, resources, expertise and knowledge."

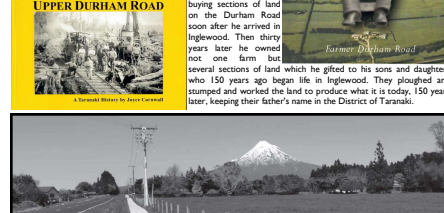

Polish History Display (Martha Szymanska)
Recently Martha did a Polish History display at the Inglewood Market Day. The main item was the book compiled by the Country Women's Institute of Durham Road published in 1993. The book, identifying the owners of the land on Upper Durham Road from bush to farmland.
It was fortunate enough to have this book reprinted and produce a dust cover to identify Mathias Gabriel Dodunski (Martha's Grandfather) who began buying sections of land on the Durham Road soon after he arrived in Inglewood. Then thirty years later owned not one farm but several sections of land which he gifted to his sons and daughters who 150 years ago began life in Inglewood. They ploughed and stumped and worked the land to produce what it is today, 150 years later, keeping their father's name in the District of Taranaki.

New IDHT Nurses (Diane Jones)

Everyone in New Zealand is IDHT apprehensive and concerned re daily household budgets and uncertainties about Health organisations and staffing and provision of services. The good news for the Inglewood District, is that Inglewood District Health Trust (the palliative and District nurses) are continuing the provision of their services, with the help of donations from the public and regular contributions from IET, and have now hired two more experienced nurses to help the team to continue to provide the quality nursing service that IDHT has a reputation for.
